

You Before Two

This term we welcomed Dr Becky Foljambe from You Before Two, a charitable foundation created to promote sexual and mental health education.

Over a series of weeks Dr Becky delivered sexual consent and gender-based violence workshops to small groups of year 11 students. The sessions aim to empower teenagers to understand and consider choice, consent and confidence.

Her focus on the law surrounding sexual consent meant that students were well informed on the realities of situations that might arise and how best to deal with them. Students reported that following the workshops they were clear on the legislation and felt more secure in making firm decisions regarding consent in the future.

Industry Event

On Wednesday 17th November, we invited a number of local engineering companies to attend 'Engineering Your Talent Pipeline: A Networking Event' at Lincoln UTC.

In September 2022 we will become the only provider in Lincolnshire to offer a T Level in Engineering. T Levels allow employers to get early sight of new talent in their industry, and can help to build a pipeline for junior positions or apprenticeships. Facilitating a placement will provide an opportunity for employers to work alongside the next generation of engineers, ensuring that they develop the knowledge, attitude and practical skills to succeed.

During the networking event attendees heard from students and employers who have already benefited from partnerships and work placements, explored the facilities at Lincoln UTC, and met fellow local employers and industrialists.

The evening was a resounding success, with companies commenting positively on the UTC ethos, our engineering department, and the attitude of our students. Following on from the event we are forging new links with some exciting engineering companies, which will join the significant number of industry partners that are already involved in the delivery of our curriculum.

After meeting company representatives at the event Y13 engineer Jonty was invited to visit ParkAcre, a market leading vitamin manufacturer, for a day of work experience. Jonty made a great impression on George Ritchie, ParkAcre's Lead Engineer, who commented on his enthusiasm, professionalism and engineering skills. George has now agreed to support Jonty with a long-term industrial placement alongside his studies.



University Visits

This term UTC students visited the School of Engineering at the University of Lincoln on two occasions. Year 13 engineers enjoyed a guided our and a masterclass, which provided a valuable insight into studying engineering at degree level.

The close connections between Lincoln UTC and the University of Lincoln provide our students with opportunities to explore the subjects of science and engineering alongside researchers within state of the art facilities, starting their careers well ahead of their peers.

Over the course of the academic year all students will visit the University's laboratories and workshops on multiple occasions to strengthen their subject knowledge and use a wide range of industry grade equipment.

Lincoln's Little Heroes

We were thrilled to support Lincoln's Little Heroes Christmas Experience for the second year by donating bespoke Christmas decorations designed and manufactured by a group of our year 10 students. We would like to say a huge thank you to Lathams Ltd for donating the wood free of charge.

Lincoln's Little Heroes was started in 2020 by George Clark, to try and create a bit of festive magic for children in the Lincoln area who are undergoing cancer treatment, immunosuppressed or shielding. Because these families would find it difficult to go out and see Father Christmas, Lincoln's Little Heroes provide a safe visit to their house to make a special memory.



The Nomad Trust

On Friday 10th December students and staff took part in a Christmas Jumper Day to raise funds for the Nomad Trust, which provides emergency access accommodation to those in need. We raised over £70 and collected donations of tinned food, selection boxes and toiletries to donate.

The Nomad Centre is the only direct access night shelter service in Lincolnshire. The centre provides shelter to adults aged 18 and over in the form of an en-suite room, laundry facilities, three meals a day, and a safe and supportive environment with access to a housing support worker.



Post-16 Open Event

Over the coming months we will be encouraging all of our year 11 students to begin planning for the future and considering their options for next steps after completing their GCSE examinations.

The Lincoln UTC sixth form was graded 'outstanding' by Ofsted in June 2019. Achievement is consistently well above that made by other students nationally and our year 13 leavers continue to be very successful in securing their desired place at university or in industry.

In September 2022 we will become the only provider in Lincolnshire to offer a T Level in Engineering. This course will expand on current post-16 option choices, which include a range of STEM-based A Levels and a Level 3 BTEC in engineering.

On **Monday 31st January** we will be hosting a Post-16 Options Evening for year 11 students and their parents/carers. During this event students will have twe opportunity to attend an options presentation and explore the choices available through short taster sessions.

We fully support our students in making the best decision for themselves as individuals and all staff members are available to offer advice and provide guidance as needed.


Exams take place in May/June and then continue in November, January and March. The rate of pay is £10.00 per hour.

Previous school and exams experience is preferred although not essential as full training and on-going support will be provided.

Exam Invigilator jobs are fantastic for candidates looking for part-time and flexible work to fit around other commitments.

You will be required to provide a minimum of 2 recent and relevant references. The role is also subject to an Enhanced DBS check, overseas police clearances where applicable and the UTC will carry out checks on eligibility to work in the UK and qualification checks where appropriate.

Teaching Assistant Vacancy

Lincoln UTC wishes to appoint a new teaching assistant to join our small but exceptional team (judged to be outstanding by Ofsted). The college is smaller than most schools but is growing in popularity. We currently have just over 300 students on roll (up from only 235 last year). Looking ahead to September we expect our student population to grow again ... to just over 350. We want our SEND team to grow in line with this, in order to continue meet the needs of all our students. Lincoln UTC currently has 23 teaching staff and a team of 6 teaching assistants. We are an uncommonly 'tight knit' and supportive community. Behaviour at the college is very good and the relationships that exist between students and staff are exceptionally positive.

The successful candidate will be actively involved in all aspects of college life and work with students across multiple subject areas, alongside the existing team.

Prior experience would be an advantage but is not a pre-requisite. Full training and support will be available. This would ideally be a full time, permanent position (term time only) but we will be happy to consider applications from strong candidates who would prefer a part time position.

The atmosphere at Lincoln UTC is both unique and special. We would welcome (indeed encourage) visits to the college so that you can see for yourself what we have to offer. Equally, we understand that this is not always possible and we will not view applications from candidates who have not visited less favourably.
